

A Message from Chairperson Sharon D. Handy

I am pleased to welcome you to Literacy Volunteers-Androscoggin's 50th Annual Meeting. We are thrilled to be sharing our golden anniversary with our dedicated volunteers, students and community.

When a group of retired teachers launched Literacy Volunteers-Androscoggin in 1974, they had no way of knowing that their efforts would still be improving lives 50 years later.

Our organization has experienced many ups and downs over the past years, including a worldwide pandemic that presented numerous challenges. But LVA survived and we are as committed as ever to providing our students the same life-changing skills.

I am especially excited to announce that starting this summer, LVA will be offering English conversation for the workplace classes at the Broadview Acres apartments in Auburn. Our good friend Mark Schlotterbeck will be returning to teach this class of 11 students.

For the current programming year (July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024) our agency has served 76 students, 63 of whom are multi-language learners. Our students represent 48 countries, including the United States. While our students come from diverse backgrounds, they all have one thing in common: the desire to improve their literacy skills and their lives. LVA and its tutors represent the ladder that allows our students to reach their full potential.

The important work of Literacy Volunteers-Androscoggin often takes place in the quiet corners of the public library or through the Zoom. Our work would be impossible without our community partners, including Androscoggin United Way, the cities of Lewiston and Auburn, Wei Li, Androscoggin Bank and Catholic Charities.

WMTW-TV has provided steadfast support as media sponsor of our largest fundraiser, Scrabble Fest Letters for Literacy, which raised \$8,500 this year. LVA also was delighted to receive \$5,640 from Dollar General and \$4,000 from an extremely generous anonymous donor. LVA also finished second in voting for Bangor Savings Bank's Community Matters More program, which resulted in a \$4,000 donation.

It has been my privilege and honor to serve as chair of the LVA Board of Directors for the last nine years. On behalf of the Board of Directors, we salute the inspiring work of our students, staff, volunteers, and tutors as we enter our 51st year!

We are excited for the next chapter and invite you to be part of it!

Literacy Volunteers - Androscoggin Director's Report - Celebrating 50 Years of Service

"We believe the ability to read and write is critical to personal freedom and the maintenance of a democratic society."

When Ruth Colvin founded Literacy Volunteers of America in 1962, all of the work of the organization was inspired by this powerful premise, and it still holds true for us today.

Education empowers. It provides adults with the tools to make informed decisions, work in the vocation of their choice, help their children succeed in school, and pursue their interests and dreams. It strengthens individuals, families, and communities economically and socially for present and future generations.

All of the remarkable people who have been involved in LV-A have made this possible for many. Over the past 50 years, approximately 1,250 volunteers shared their time and talent to help over 2,000 students gain the skills they needed to improve their lives. More than 200,000 volunteer hours were given by board members, tutors, English conversation partners, trainers, and a host of people that shared their time with us for specific needs, projects and fundraisers, making it feasible for an agency with a tiny staff and budget to provide life-changing services.

Since 1974, our affiliate has grown and deepened its expertise to serve the changing needs of the community. When I first started in 1996, national was adding a component to tutor training about learning disabilities. Nationwide, many of the adults participating in the program had fallen through the cracks either with an undiagnosed learning disability, or a lack of special education services to help them successfully learn to read, write or compute. Retired special education teacher, Judy Webber, became our special education trainer and guru, increasing the depth of our knowledge about this challenging subject and creating additional testing for students. The torch was then passed to Sue Reilly, also a retired special education teacher, who brought her expertise to the training team, as well as to the parents and children in our Knowledge as Power Family Literacy Program.

In 2000, our community became more diverse with the influx of Somali refugees. At the time, 7% of our students were English Language learners and we were in dire need of training to help our volunteers teach them English effectively. We were fortunate to connect with experts from the University of Maine system and volunteers that were working in the local school system who had training in this area. Subsequently, Americorp volunteer, Susan Rottman, helped us develop and implement the English conversation partners program, a modified version of a project she participated in, in New York.

In more recently years, Sara Boss, retired ELL teacher joined our ranks and has become our go-to guru for training and advice for volunteers who are working with Multilanguage learners. To date, we have worked with students from 48 countries, including the United States and are grateful to all of the amazing volunteers that have connected us with new knowledge and resources.

Another shift was necessary during the pandemic, when a group of determined volunteers researched, practiced, and gave us the information needed for LV-A trainers Joyce Bucciantini and Lynn Busch to create a zoom training geared to teaching adult students one-on-one virtually. We went on to adapt tutor and English conversation partners training to a virtual version.

Each and every volunteer has contributed their own expertise, forming the magic glue that has made this affiliate able to grow and meet the changing needs of the community. And every student that has pursued their goals with grit and determination, often while working two or more jobs and raising a family, have been an inspiration.

All of you here and all that have been involved over the last 50 years have realized impressive results. Since formal record keeping in 1996, at least 95% of our students that have participated 50 hours or more have met at least two of their life skill goals. They have earned certificates or degrees, created successful businesses, bought homes, helped their children succeed in school and become leaders in their community.

Heartfelt thanks to all of our LV-A heroes.
